





Merrick Baker-Bates, CMG, CStJ

After studying modern history at Hertford College, Oxford and attending the College of Europe in 1961, Merrick joined the British Diplomatic Service in 1963, starting his diplomatic career in Tokyo as a language student, and becoming 3rd and 2nd Secretary there between 1963–68. After being 1st Secretary in Washington 1973–76, he returned to Tokyo as 1st Secretary, later Commercial Councillor 1976–82. He then left the civil service to join Cornes & Co. for three years, re-joining the FCO as Deputy High Commissioner in Kuala Lumpur 1986–89. Becoming the first Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territories in 1990, he was later posted to Los Angeles as Consul-General for five years before his retirement in 1998 to Creaton, Northamptonshire. During a long and varied retirement working with local and other charities including St John Ambulance (for which he was awarded CStJ) and the church, he also served as a sensitivity reviewer marking documents for release at the FCO records office at Hanslope Park.





The Chapel of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire St Paul's Cathedral



There have been churches and religious buildings on this site since Roman times, the first cathedral dedicated to St Paul being consecrated in 604 by Mellitus, Bishop of the East Saxons.

The building of 'Old St Paul's' – the fourth cathedral – was begun on an enormous scale in 1087 and not completed until 1300. During an extension of this building eastwards, it was agreed that an adjacent parish church would be knocked down on condition that a chapel in the crypt of the cathedral could be used by the parish as their church: the Chapel of St Faith under St Paul's. The new cathedral built by Christopher Wren was completed in 1710 with a new Chapel of St Faith, which since 1960 has also been designated as the Chapel of the Order of the British Empire.

The Order of the British Empire was instituted by King George V in 1917 initially to recognise the considerable civilian contribution to the war effort during the 1914-18 war. It was a pioneering honour in its day, being the first five-class Order for national distribution and the first to admit women to membership. It has become the nation's most well-recognised honour.

Today all members of the Order and those who have been awarded the British Empire Medal, together with their children, are accorded the privilege of being married in the Chapel. Their children and grandchildren may also be baptised in the Chapel.
